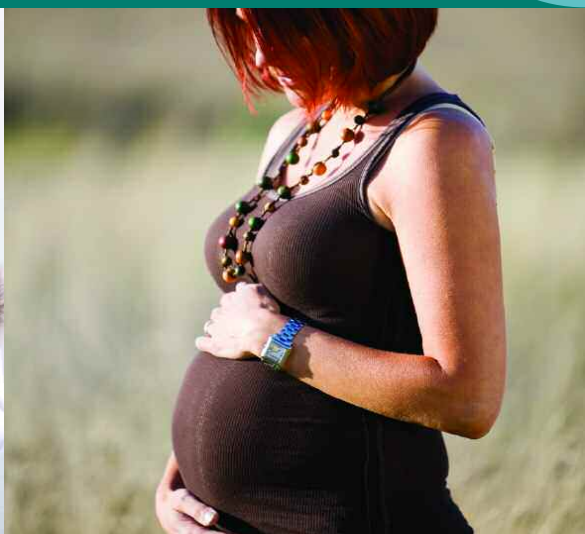

Content is provided by the Cochrane Collaboration and access by Wiley InterScience. Currently free of charge to HE and FE institutions in the UK, and to all residents of Wales.

Some of the MIDIRS services, including online access to their bibliographic database, the print version of the MIDIRS Midwifery Digest and a personalised updating service (My MIDIRS) require a subscription. There is also a forum bulletin board where evidence-based clinical practice guidelines are being collected.

Mortality Statistics: Childhood, Infant and Perinatal (Series DH3)

Based on the report of the Registrar General in England and Wales, these statistics contain data on stillbirths, infant and perinatal deaths, and deaths of children aged under 16. There is also analysis of associated risk factors, such as social class and ethnic origin.

Women's Experiences of Maternity Care in the NHS in England

The Healthcare Commission (an NHS healthcare watchdog), carried out a survey of 26,000 women in early 2007, using methodology developed by the National Perinatal Epidemiology Unit for its 2006 survey, Recorded Delivery: a National Survey of Women's Experience of Maternity Care. The 2007 survey found that a majority of women were satisfied with NHS maternity services overall, but with significant minorities unhappy with some aspects of the service, or not receiving the full range of services laid out in NHS guidelines. The Healthcare Commission website has a summary report and a number of datasets available to download.
